What's the National Science Foundation?

- Independent federal agency
- Divided into directorates; each directorate is made up of divisions
- Mission
 - To promote the progress of science,
 - To advance the national health, prosperity, and welfare,
 - To secure the national defense.
- T-AP DGT is being managed out of the Social, Behavioral and Economic Sciences Directorate (SBE) at NSF



NEH 101

The term 'humanities' includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following: language, both modern and classical; linguistics; literature; history; jurisprudence; philosophy; archaeology; comparative religion; ethics; the history, criticism, and theory of the arts; those aspects of **social sciences** which have humanistic content and employ humanistic methods; and the study and application of the humanities to...**the current condition of national life**.

-National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities Act of 1965

- NEH supports research projects at all stages of development and in all areas of the humanities, including interdisciplinary and cross-disciplinary approaches.
- NEH defines research in broad terms. Eligible research might include release time for work in archives and libraries; writing; archaeological excavation; ethnographic fieldwork; creation of digital and traditional print research tools, editions, and translations; collaborations and convenings.



What is T-AP DGT?

- Partnership among 12 funding agencies from 9 countries on both sides of the Atlantic to fund scientific research on democracy, governance, and trust (DGT)
- T-AP aims to:
 - Catalyze and support transnational collaborative research in the social sciences and humanities
 - Support outstanding collaborative research projects that contribute to our understanding of challenges and opportunities affecting DGT
 - Co-develop robust and resilient work programs with communities and key stakeholders
 - Promote equity, diversity, and inclusion



Objectives

- Improve and innovate conceptualization and theorizing of DGT
- Address topics aimed at collective responses to global challenges to DGT
- Define and describe opportunities, challenges and crises relevant to DGT
- Offer methodological, disciplinary, and cross disciplinary perspectives
- Interventions to enhance democratic processes, governance, rebuild trust
- Co-development of work programs with communities and key stakeholders
- The role of digital media, tools and technologies in eroding or strengthening DGT



Research themes

- Concepts, understandings, & models of democracy, governance and trust
- Education
- Media, information, and communication
- Economies and economic systems
- Identities, discrimination, marginalization
- Ecosystems and environments
- Epistemologies, knowledge, and expertise.
- History and culture

What will NSF/SBE fund?

- Though T-AP DGT is written to incorporate social sciences and the humanities, NSF does not fund the humanities, but NEH does.
- Fund all social and behavioral science fields and combinations thereof—see the SBE website to see what is funded (https://nsf.gov/SBE)
- What will SBE not fund?
 - Clinical, counseling, business administration, social work, education (except science education), and history (except history of science)
 - Research with disease related goals
 - Animal models and development and testing of drugs



Application process

- A research team consists of national teams from at least 3 T-AP countries on both sides of the Atlantic. Team submits ONE joint proposal
- One PI from the team is designated at the lead PI
- Lead PI creates an account at FAPESP
- Lead PI submits the NOI and the joint proposal to FAPESP portal; lead is the point of contact for the Team
- For NSF, there is no need to submit a separate proposal unless you hear that your project has been recommended for funding
- Lead PI submits REQUIRED Notice of Intent to submit at FAPESP portal by September 15, 2023
- Full proposals are due by November 6, 2023
- Pay particular attention to the FAPESP instructions and NSF & NEH addenda



NEH's DGT requirements

- To apply for an NEH award, at least one member of your team must a) be working on the humanities component of your project and b) must be at a US institution of higher education. Sorry, NEH cannot make awards or subawards to non-US institutions.
- The total request from the United States (NEH + NSF) cannot exceed \$200,000.
- If you are requesting an award from NEH, create a single PDF with the following files:
 - Completed SF-424 Short Organizational Form
 - Statement of humanities significance and humanities work plan (suggested length: 2 pages)
 - Completed R&R budget form for amount requested of NEH
 - Budget justification
- Name your single document with "NEH" clearly in the title to then add it to the ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTS section of your team's submission to T-AP.
- Failure to submit the required documents will make your application ineligible.

Budgets

- Each national team submits a budget request (for the US, the budget must comply with NSF/NEH requirements: see NSF & NEH addenda)
- The national budgets are converted to euros and consolidated into a project budget, and that is the budget that is submitted with the proposal
- Note that the national maximum is the maximum the national team can get, it is not the maximum project budget.
- If your project is selected for an award, you submit the same proposal, NSF/NEH formatted budget, and a few other administrative documents to NSF/NEH for funding.



NEH budget information

- NEH awards cannot be used for: subawards to foreign institution or organization, activities performed by federal entities, promotion of a particular political agenda, advocacy of a particular program of social action, lobbying efforts, or work that falls outside the humanities. See the NEH Addendum for additional guidance.
- The T-AP DGT call uses peer review very similar to the review procedures followed by NEH.
- Awardees will be required to submit final financial and narrative reports.
- NEH will pay indirect costs; cost-sharing is not required.



Review process

- Review process is very similar to what NSF and NEH use: Involves international, interdisciplinary panel review
- Proposals are first checked to see if they comply with the T-AP DGT criteria
- Adjudication panel meets to review, rank, and make funding recommendation based on their reading of the proposals
- Funders forum meets to choose final slate of projects to be funded
- Lead PI is notified once a decision is made to fund or not



Review criteria

- Review considerations are similar to those of NSF:
 - Intellectual merit
 - Relevance to the call
 - Quality, innovation, and feasibility of research plan
 - Broader impact
 - Partnerships and planning



National addenda

- If your proposal is chosen for funding, NSF/NEH addendum or both provide additional guidance on how to submit your proposal to NSF for funding
- Some national addenda documentation is similar to those of FAPESP but additional documents

- NSF addendum provides additional guidance in preparing your proposal for funding to NSF
